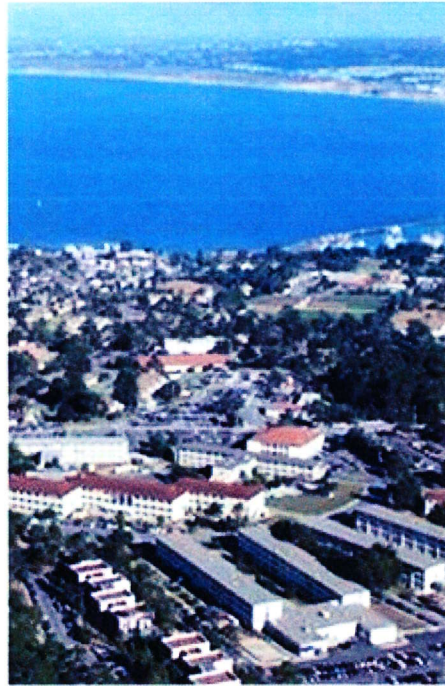

# Presidio of Monterey - Water



## Introduction

- Home to DLIFLC, the only dedicated foreign language training facility in DoD and the largest institution of its kind in the nation
  - DLIFLC & POM are at the forefront of the Global War on Terrorism by providing culturally-based foreign language training to military linguists
  - DLIFLC graduates approximately 2,500 military linguists annually from all four branches of the military
  - DLIFLC offers resident courses in over 24 languages at POM
  - “Because in the 21st century, military strength will be measured not only by the weapons our troops carry, but by the languages they speak and the cultures they understand.” *(President Obama’s address to Veterans)*
  - “[Foreign language courses at DLIFLC are] as important as any undertaking we have in the United States military at this time.” *(Admiral Mike Mullen, the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff)*



# Presidio of Monterey - Water



## Current Situation

- Department of Defense Future Years Defense Plan FY11 – FY15 for Presidio of Monterey (POM)
  - Includes four projects worth approximately \$164M
    - FY11:
      - General Instruction Building (GIB) \$39M
      - Barracks Complex \$63M
        - » Barracks
        - » Dining Facility
        - » Administrative space for USMC & USN
      - Demolition of Barracks Complex



# Presidio of Monterey - Water



## Accomplishments

- Reduced annual water usage on Presidio of Monterey from 301 acre feet in FY98 to 160 acre feet in FY09
  - Widespread installation of waterless urinals
  - Recycle rinse water in dishwashing operations in dining facilities
  - Privatization of water systems, metering of all buildings, and promotion of water conservation
  - Student population 2,663 in FY98 and 2,806 in FY09
- All new construction FY08 forward is being dual piped to accept rainwater/recycled water





# Presidio of Monterey - Water



- Impact (if no water):
  - Potential loss of project funding (approximately \$164M)
  - Failure to meet DLI mission needs
  - Outdated and less environmentally friendly facilities
  - Significant resource challenges if we are required to move
  - Fail to provide SM with a quality of life commensurate with the quality of their service
    - Bldg 627-1957                      53 years
    - Bldg 629-1965                      45 years
- Way Forward: POM staff will continue to meet with MPWMD staff to determine a solution.
  - Supported by neighboring municipalities and other local, State, and Federal leaders
  - Army support of regional water projects
    - ASR
    - Recycled water pipeline easement
